

More than 110 students representing Wardlaw Academy in Edgefield, Cambridge Academy and Greenwood Christian in Greenwood and McCormick Elementary in McCormick were present to learn about wildlife, farm animals, honey production, forestry practices, horticulture, water quality and food production. Students in the Wilderness Program at John de la Howe School served as tour guides. Founded in 1797, John de la Howe School serves at risk children in grades 6-12 and offers a safe haven for them to heal, grow and make lasting changes.
